A message from Fr. Bill

It is important to note that in the verse which concluded last week's Gospel, Jesus had been addressing His disciples about the future and stressed that "neither the day nor the hour" was identifiable. This inability to know when Christ will return requires a change in attitude, to always be alert and ready when it comes, so as not to be taken by surprise when it happens. This week's parable highlights the fact that there are tasks that must be attended to while waiting. In addition, the Parable of the Talents illustrates the importance of the time between when the Master has left and the Lord's return in glory "after a long time." So, from the Lord's Ascension until His Second Coming or Parousia, waiting is not the only thing necessary, since being entrusted with the Master's goods, we also have things to do. The term talent was a monetary unit used when large sums of money were involved. A single talent was worth six thousand Greek drachmas or the equivalent of seventy-five pounds of gold or one talent represented the salary for around six thousand days of work! Thus, a considerable amount of money was entrusted to these servants, even the third servant who received only one talent! In other words, they were entrusted with an enormous amount of financial capital, each according to their perceived ability. The level of trust exhibited by such philanthropy is not only unheard of but goes far beyond reason or prudential financial management. The master is banking on the reliability of his servants to properly use the wealth he has placed at their disposal. Hence, it is obvious that only God could act in such a manner. When finally the master returns, the first two servants did very well and both of them are congratulated in identical terms that extol what they had done and invite them into the master's joy: "Well done, my good and faithful servant." Realizing the mind-boggling amount of money that they began with and having doubled that amount, you can only begin to imagine the implications when the master promises to "give [them] great responsibilities." The enormity even the impossibility of those responsibilities, reveals that this is no normal business dealing between investor and entrepreneurs; no, this illustrates how God works. He bestows infinite riches upon those servants who have prudently and faithfully used the spiritual capital or grace that He lavishes upon those who love Him. Yet, the fate and terrible punishment meted out to the third servant further illustrates the ultimate fate of humanity. This servant seemingly did nothing overtly wrong; instead, he buried the single talent he had been entrusted with "out of fear" of the master. If this servant was chastised or if the master had decried his lack of initiative and told the servant that he would never receive any future money, we would see that as reasonable and understandable. However, to be labeled as a useless servant, to be thrown out "into the darkness outside, where there [would] be wailing and grinding of teeth" seems like an over-reaction, even an excessive punishment. Don't forget that this is a parable and, so, it entails the use of any everyday occurrence that yields an eternal truth. The matter at hand concerns the Lord's ultimate return in glory after a long and protracted absence. If we frame our faith and the actions which faith in God demand in terms of contractual duties, if religion is merely complying with its minimal demands observed out of fear, we grossly misunderstand who God really is—the time between Christ's return to the Father and His coming again in glory is a time of active waiting but, better yet, a time of generous doing!
